HELLO DARLIN' AND WELCOME TO COWETA COUNTY!



Curious to know more? Read on to get your fill.



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

Or perhaps you'd prefer a stroll through Dunaway Gardens, whose nooks and nestles give major *Secret Garden* vibes. Then there's Chattahoochee Bend State Park, where the fish always bite and the trails roll on.

The first "settlement," which is two miles south of modern-day Senoia (pronounced "Seh-noy") was called "Location." Which if you were to ask us—and we're assuming you are—never really moved past its location since it no longer exists. Senoia, on the other hand, is living its best life.

Comprised mainly of one historic district on the National Register of Historic Places, Senoia is a treasure trove of architectural pleasures. Officially incorporated in 1866, then chartered in 1905, the city is as real as it gets.

Except sometimes, it plays a fictional community for the small and silver screens. Home to Raleigh Studios, Senoia and its historically charming downtown have served as the backdrop to a variety of movies and TV shows including *Fried Green Tomatoes*, *Driving Miss Daisy*, the remake of *Footloose*, and our favorite zombie-fest, *The Walking Dead*.

Don't worry, the show doesn't stop in Senoia when the director calls cut. With a bustling main street, cute boutiques, and ridiculously good eats, the city is the perfect setting for your next big break. Plus, with some big development plans in the making, there will be plenty of opportunities for a few takes at the action.

MORELAND

DON'T LET THE NAME FOOL YOU.

Moreland actually has less land than you might expect. In fact, according to the U.S. Census Bureau, Moreland has a total area of 0.93 square miles. Blink and you may miss it, but don't blink and you may learn a lot. Like the fact that once upon a time in 1827, there was a Georgia Land Lottery. The winners didn't get chicken dinners; instead, they got deeds to land.

By 1843, farmers moved in, tilled the fields, and built the Mt. Zion Methodist Church. After that the train arrived, helping to connect the town, the people, and the myriad of business ventures to Atlanta and LaGrange.

From cotton and peaches and hosiery to Lewis Grizzard the humorist and Erskine Caldwell the novelist, Moreland has produced much history in its time. Take a gander to the bluebird town, where you'll find yourself far from "anywhere USA" but close to small-town charm.

SHARPSBURG

MOST CARING CITY.

Named one of the country's Most Caring Cities in 2020 by Insurify, Sharpsburg is giving us all the feels. But before we get into those, let's go back in time to 1871, when the city was officially incorporated. Back then, the town—which was circular with a quarter-mile radius extending to its railroad depot—was named for a judge, Elias Sharp, and owed much of its growth to agriculture. And by agriculture, we mean cotton.

From the late 1800s through the early 1900s, the town enjoyed a great deal of growth, including professional services, a bank, doctors, but also cotton. However, by 1920—you guessed it—cotton wasn't doing so well. Unfortunately, no cotton, no capital. And no capital, no growth.

The city stayed stagnant until 1940, when it began its slow, steady return. The 1934 opening of the theatrical training grounds at Dunaway Gardens was one helpful addition to its visitor and residential increase. Another amenity driving growth was the opening of the renowned Chattahoochee Bend State Park. Plus, who are we kidding, everyone is curious about what makes Sharpsburg so darn caring.







HARALSON

LET'S TACO BOUT IT.

Ever wanted to discover some place where the population was less than your high school's graduating class? Curious to know what it feels like to live in a community where everyone knows your name? What if you found yourself in a town with no stoplights? Well, there are stop signs, and it's really quite nice when you know your neighbors.

So, we'd say you should give the town of Haralson a visit. Plus, it is the oldest city in Coweta County, which means it definitely deserves some respect.

TURIN

LIVING THE GOOD LIFE SINCE 1890.

If the name gave you The Italian Job vibes, you'd not be inaccurate. In 1870, the town of Preston was renamed Turin after Turin, Italy. Why the name change? Besides Italy being absolutely dreamy, the railroad was coming. However, unlike the Italians, the people of Turin weren't big fans of wine and stipulated that the railroad was only allowed to pass through town if the trains were alcoholfree and always allowed passenger service. As you can imagine, times changed and so did those rules.

The first house built in the newly established town of Turin was owned by the Page sisters. You read that right: Ladies in Georgia were owning property and making moves in the 1870s. Since the Page women rolled out the welcome mat, much has happened. Bricks were laid for stores, a post office popped up, coin was to be had at the Turin Banking Company, church bells rang, and schools were in session. It was a bustling community, prosperous by most accounts. That is until 1927, when the bank closed and the money dried up.

It wasn't until the water system was completed in 1965 that the well was finally turned back on for the community. Growth came slowly, but steadily. In 2005, the first subdivision opened. In 2009, Turin restored the historic Walter B. Hill Industrial School-the only vocational school serving African Americans in Coweta County in 1927-turning it into the Town Hall.

It may not be Italy, but this Turin has plenty of potential and is much easier to get to.



ANNUAL EVENTS

FALL (SEPT-NOV)

Art Walk

The Art Walk Event is a celebration of local art and is hosted twice a year, in March and September, in downtown Newnan. Visitors can expect to stroll through 25 or more locations and see the work of more than 40 artists in a wide variety of art styles and mediums.

Cruisin' to the Oldies

The car show is an annual event held in September and open for cars 25 years and older. Held on Mainstreet Senoia and surrounding streets, this event is enjoyed by all ages. Free for spectators and featuring vendors, artisans, food trucks, and live music for entertainment.

Turin Antique Farm Power Show & Tractor Pull

Hosted each September since 1995 by the Turin Antique Tractor Association, which promotes the history of the eastern Coweta County farming culture and strives to keep its farming heritage alive with this annual event.

Gypsy Junkers

Held annually in the spring and fall in Moreland, this fair is comprised of 70-plus vendors showcasing antiques, handmade arts and crafts, retro and vintage furniture and decor, jewelry, locally grown plants, yard art, and more. Free parking and admission.

Christmas Tour of Homes

Oktoberfest

This annual beer-tasting event highlights craft brews from across the state of Georgia. Complimentary refreshments, retail sales specials, and other treats are available for all attendees.

Spirits & Spice Festival

It's time to eat, drink, and get spooky! Have a gourd time in October as downtown Newnan businesses feature spooky specialty cocktails, locals participate in a chili cookoff, and artisans show off their wares.


Holiday Sip & See

This annual event each November is the perfect opportunity for downtown Newnan visitors to get started on their holiday shopping while inventory is plentiful. Come enjoy a night market, live music, and food trucks along with hors d'oeuvres and refreshments from the retailers.

WINTER (DEC-FEB)

Newnan Christmas Tour of Homes

"The City of Homes" evokes images of antebellum homes lovingly restored to their original splendor. This annual tour, held the first Saturday in December, is an opportunity for everyone to view these beautiful residences decked out in their holiday best. The tour also showcases more contemporary homes and decor alongside the historical properties.



Senoia Candlelight Tour of Homes

Held annually in early December, visitors can take a step back in time to learn about Senoia's past through historic home tours. Downtown shops and restaurants stay open late offering tour specials.

SPRING (MAR-MAY)

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Tour of Coweta/ Rock & Road Festival

This multi-faceted event is held in April and is kicked off with the annual Tour of Coweta Century Ride featuring multiple routes in 25-, 45-, 62-, and 100-mile rides. The Rock & Road Festival, hosted around the Newnan square, is open to the public and features live music, food trucks, vendors, and craft beverages.

SUMMER (JUNE-AUG)

Southern LitFest

Pack your book bag, lace up your sneakers, and follow all roads leading to Georgia's literary pathway and on to its trailhead—downtown Newnan. Join bestselling authors, poets, and columnists as they discuss all things Southern. Visitors can also sample craft bourbons from the porches of antebellum estates. It all comes together each June for one magical Southern moment.

Summer NewnaNights

Held the second Thursday of the month, this summer event series features family-friendly music and entertainment. At each event, Greenville Street Park is filled with various festivities, food trucks, and booths. Downtown businesses stay open late with promotions for shoppers and quests.

Summer Wined-Up

Held each June, downtown Newnan's wine-tasting event features a "wine walk" that moves through more than 25 host locations in downtown businesses.

Jazz in the Park

A summer music series hosted by the Newnan Cultural Arts Commission in downtown Newnan's Greenville Street Park. On the second Friday of every month, bring your blanket, beverages, picnic baskets, and dancing shoes for a great family night of light, smooth strains of jazz by various artists.

Pick out some produce at the Senoia Farmers Market

Senoia comes alive every Saturday at this popular market. Farmers sell seasonal fruits and veggies, while local artisans set up shop with everything from jewelry to homemade soap to hot sauce. Be sure to visit when live bands are on the schedule.

2 Check out the Historic Coweta County Courthouse

With a copper dome rising 100 feet above street level, this 1904 Classic Revival building towers above Newnan's town square, but it also has some dark history: It held the famous 1948 Murder in Coweta County trial—subject of several podcasts and a movie.





3 Savor a Sweet Pig donut at Heirloom Bakeshop

Sink your teeth into an Heirloom donut and you'll quickly see why this shop has become a favorite. The Sweet Pig is maple-frosted and topped with bacon; other favorites include Cookies 'n' Cream and classics like the original glazed and strawberry sprinkles.

Enjoy the eggs-ellent Eggs Dijon at Bistro Hilary

Designed to look like a French bistro, this upscale Senoia dining spot has a menu full of tempting plates, but the crispy Eggs Dijon is a crowd pleaser. Pair the savory appetizer with a Paris-themed cocktail on the front or back patio.

View the latest display at Barbie Beach

Stop by this unique highway attraction in Turin to see an assortment of Barbies and Kens posed in different arrangements often based on current events. Steve and Linda Quick have kept locals and roadtrippers entertained with the whimsical displays since their first during the 2006 Winter Olympics.

6 Relish the fried pickles at Redneck Gourmet

One of the oldest restaurants in Newnan, this beloved spot serves up plenty of crave-worthy dishes, including the Redneck Burger topped with bacon and their famous fried green tomatoes, but the fried pickles with ranch are a tried-and-true staple.

Feel a spiritual presence at Bonnie Castle

Built in 1896, this Victorian-era mansion has been the center of paranormal activity in Grantville for decades. Among the sightings are a ghost named Mary and a spectral cat. Today, you can book a stay in one of the inn's rooms through Airbnb and experience the haunted vibe for yourself.

Try the latest flavor at Rock Salt Milk Bar

Nearly everything is made inhouse at this Newnan ice cream shop, and flavors frequently rotate based on the season. Fresh peach and blueberry lemon lavender are popular in summer, while white chocolate peppermint and gingersnap cheesecake are winter winners.

9 Kayak down the Chattahoochee River

The 2,910-acre Chattahoochee Bend State Park is one of the largest state parks in Georgia and provides an ideal spot for kayaking. After a day of paddling, rent a nearby cottage or campsite to relax amid the forest's natural beauty.

Meander around historic neighborhoods

Nicknamed the "City of Homes," Newnan has six districts listed on the National Historic Registry. Be sure to check out 167 LaGrange Street, one of the oldest standing homes in the city built circa 1828, as well as 155 Greenville Street, which has been featured in many shows and movies.








EXPLORE






ESCAPE TO THE GREAT OUTDOORS

CHATTAHOOCHEE BEND STATE PARK IS A NATURE-LOVER'S PARADISE

Sometimes we need to get away from it all, and there's no better destination to easily do this than Chattahoochee Bend State Park. As one of the newest and largest parks in the state, Chattahoochee Bend offers something for everyone within its nearly 3,000 picturesque acres.




"Two things I love about Chattahoochee Bend are the solitude and ecological diversity," says Phil LaRue, president of Friends of Chattahoochee Bend. "[The park] is so quiet and peaceful; it's easy to just kick back and relax the day away. Whether you string up a hammock and take a nap or hike one of the many trails, you're guaranteed to find a special spot to forget your day-to-day cares and decompress."

If you're planning a Chattahoochee Bend adventure, you'll want to gather essentials ahead of time, including sunblock, lunch or snacks, beverages, insect repellent, and whatever else your family might need. The park is known for being wonderfully remote—perfect for unplugging—but if you do forget any items, there's a great little store at the visitors center that carries basic necessities, some branded items, and even souvenirs.

Take your pick from a variety of activities once you arrive. Water lovers will delight in five miles of riverfront—use the boat access to launch into the river or choose to paddleboard to get closer to scenery. For a water excursion with a challenge, start paddling at the Highway 16 bridge boat ramp, and get ready for a few shoals, plus class 1 and class 2 rapids. Canoes and kayaks are available to rent, or you can bring your own. If you're not a boat person, don't despair; fishing is another pastime the park offers, and the observation deck is a fine spot to check out native flora and fauna.

To view more unspoiled nature, explore 12 miles of beautiful, peaceful trails for walking, running, or biking. Hoping to catch a glimpse of wildlife? The Turkey Head Trail, about 4.4 miles in length, is a beginner's level trail offering beautiful views and solitude. Slightly more challenging is the Brown Thrasher Trail, 1.6 miles in length and dipping into a steep ravine after starting off mostly flat, then dropping again. Or try Trailhead 1 to Riverside Tower, a moderate-level trail of 6.1



miles that features an observation tower on the river.

For guests who want to stay overnight, Chatta-hoochee Bend has options for all comfort levels. Choose from different camping experiences, including backcountry campsites for a taste of wilderness, platform camping, walk-in campsites, and RV/trailer sites. Prefer not to rough it? Book one of the three cottages and relax with a full kitchen and screened-in porch.

Nature photographers will relish opportunities to glimpse otters, beavers, bald eagles, and ospreys along the river, says Phil Delestrez, northern natural resources manager for the Georgia Department of Natural Resources. He notes that there's also birch, hackberry, and native river cane along the bottomland forest. Visitors often spot turkeys, deer, and a variety of gorgeous birds, including hawks, and the park's flat-rock granite outcrops are vibrant with yellow daisies in autumn and white, yellow, or red daisies in spring. "Chattahoochee Bend is a naturalist's dream," he says.

Brown's Mill Historic Site

One of the newest but also one of the largest state parks encompassing nearly 3,000 acres. It features hiking trails, boat ramps, camping sites, cabins, and playgrounds. Hours: 7 a.m.–10 p.m. daily.

Dunaway Gardens

Opened in 1934 as a theatrical training ground, Dunaway boasts of unsurpassed beauty throughout the seasons. Frequented during the '30s and '40s by a cast of colorful visitors, including Walt Disney and owner Minnie Pearl, it grew to become a local treasure. Restored in 2000, it is one of the South's largest natural rock and floral gardens featuring spring-fed pools, stone waterfalls, and extensive hand-laid paths, walls, and staircases. Currently under renovation, it will soon reopen to the public.

James E. McGuffey Nature Center

Located just off I- 85 South on the Coweta County Fairgrounds, it is situated at the head of a paved, handicap-accessible trail and five other natural trails. The paved trail meanders through a woodland area of pines and hardwoods and an overgrowth of privet and other species. The unpaved trails are located next to a spring-fed pond with older hardwoods and native azaleas. Non-native shrubs and trees surround the nature center's courtyard and entry area. Hours: Tuesday-Saturday 8:30 a.m.-4:30 p.m.



The oldest existing Carnegie Library in Georgia opened its doors in 1904. Still operating as a public library, this building bears the iconic "City of Homes" marauee, one of the most recognizable landmarks of historic downtown Newnan. Hours: Monday-Friday 9 a.m.-5 p.m.; Saturday 9 a.m.-12 p.m

ChildrenConnect Museum

ChildrenConnect incorporates interactive exhibits that encourage children to engage with and learn through active play. The museum is housed in the former building for the Male Academy Classroom, which was established in 1840 and was where students received instruction. Hours: Tuesday-Saturday, 12-4 p.m.



Coweta County African American Heritage Museum

Housed in a restored shotgun-style house, this museum is a repository for African American artifacts and records and serves as a genealogy workroom for research. Adjacent to the museum is the Farmer Street Cemetery, possibly the largest slave cemetery in the South. Hours: By appointment only.

The research library is home to a large inventory of historical and genealogical books, publications, reference books, magazines, and pamphlets. Hours: Wednesday-Friday (and the first Saturday of the month) 10 a.m.-4 p.m. (If the flag is out, they are open.)



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CYCLES OF LIFE

LOCATED IN THE CHATTAHOOCHEE VALLEY, COWETA IS PART OF GEORGIA'S CYCLING DESTINATION

Fresh air and open space to enjoy the ride are what cyclists long for—and they increasingly are finding these options along the Chatt Valley. Known as Georgia's cycling destination, the region covers a handful of counties and offer opportunities for road cycling, mountain biking, and even gravel cycling. With scenic routes throughout Carroll, Fulton, Harris, Troup, Muscogee, and Coweta counties, the region offers a great way to explore our state's natural beauty on two wheels.



Coweta County is a valuable part of the Chattahoochee Valley Cycling experience for good reason. Just 45 minutes from downtown Atlanta and 30 minutes from Hartsfield-Jackson International Airport, Newnan and other Coweta towns have become destinations for anyone who wants to ride for enjoyment or participate in a cycling event. Cyclists who travel through Coweta on the Chatt Valley will appreciate light traffic, rich scenery to admire, and even a friendly face or two to share the ride.

Bike Coweta, a hub for the local cycling community, advocates for Coweta being a cycling destination and must-see portion of Chatt Valley network. Chair Chris Doane points out that although development continues to trickle in, Coweta offers a slower-paced environment that cyclists relish, especially on long-distance rides. VeloCity, a century ride benefiting Atlanta's Grady Hospital, "spends a lot of the day in Coweta," Doane points out. Another ride, the **Tour of Coweta**, has beckoned cyclists from more than 10 different states. Because the trails travel from south Fulton all the way to Columbus, the counties work together to encourage more bike activity. "We have worked with other counties' marketing organizations, and we have all taken on cycling activities as a draw for tourism," says Doane.

Mountain bikers, too, will enjoy exploring Coweta's portion of the Chatt Valley.

Opportunities for mountain biking include trails at **Brown's Mill Battlefield**, and in total there are 14 different mountain bike trail sites, according to Doane. "Brown's Mill is about six and a half miles, and together, the trails probably offer between 150 and 200 miles of mountain biking trails in Chatt Valley," he says.

Additionally, **Bike Coweta's Rock & Road Festival**—held the same weekend as the Tour of Coweta—includes mountain bike races at Brown's Mill Battlefield. Meanwhile, the **Junior Rippers** mountain bike team, for ages 6 to



12, has drawn a young and fervent crowd each season according to Brent Snodgrass, operations manager for Coweta County Parks & Recreation. "It's a fun program," says Snodgrass. "We've had this one kid from Sandy Springs who has been in the program since the beginning. I would say almost half the kids in the program are from outside of the county."

"It's really bike-friendly here in Coweta; there are tons of places to ride," agrees Parks Avery, a lifelong cyclist and Newnan resident. "I biked 30 miles this morning, and it was just beautiful. The birds and horses all look at you. Plus, it's great exercise."



GLIMPSES INTO THE PAST

SELF-GUIDED HISTORIC DISTRICT TOURS TAKE VISITORS BACK TO A BYGONE ERA

Coweta County's rich heritage dates back nearly 200 years, when the area opened for settlement in 1827 following Georgia's fifth Land Lottery. Many early residents were successful farmers, merchants, and politicians, and their grand homes and businesses stood as testaments to their prosperity. Today the preservation of these structures—representing a variety of architectural styles ranging from Federal and Gothic Revival to Queen Anne and Victorian—is an integral part of the county's focus.



The City of Newnan boasts six districts with a National Register of Historic Places designation, and locals and visitors alike can enjoy self-guided tours. The best place to begin is the **Downtown Historic District**, anchored by the neo-Greek Revival courthouse designed by renowned architect James W. Golucke. This area also includes the Carnegie Library, McRitchie-Hollis Museum, Murray Warehouse Block, Reese Opera House, Virginia House Hotel, and the old train depot. Nearby is Oak Hill Cemetery, the final resting place of many of the city's most prominent citizens as well as more than 250 Confederate soldiers.

The residential **Cole Town Historic District** developed around the R.D. Cole Company, a once-prosperous business that produced millwork, machinery, and water towers.

Many homes here display ornate railings,



decorative pilasters, and intricately carved moldings that reflect the company's fine architectural woodwork.

The **College-Temple Historic District** is a classic example of a well-planned neighborhood, with parks, churches, schools, and tree-lined streets. This area features magnificent homes with a wide range of architectural styles as well as the Male Academy, formerly a boys' college preparatory school that now serves as a children's museum, and two houses that were part of College Temple, a private school for girls.

In contrast to the intentional layouts of other districts, the **Greenville-LaGrange Historic District** developed along two major highways and includes both older and newer homes. The antebellum house located at 87 LaGrange Street served as Confederate headquarters during the Battle of Brown's Mill.

The Newnan Cotton Mill and Mill Village
Historic District is representative of early
20th-century Georgia mill communities. The mill,
now converted into loft apartments, was once
a bustling center of commerce. The adjacent
village provided housing for workers.

As its name implies, **Platinum Point Historic District** is a collection of homes built by some

of Newnan's wealthiest citizens. This district, which showcases a variety of Revival-style architecture, emerged with the prevalence of automobiles as is evidenced by the many outbuildings that were used as garages.

A few miles down the road from Newnan is the tiny town of **Senoia**, a picturesque community that has served as a backdrop to numerous films and television shows. With its own vast collection of architectural treasures, much of the town comprises a historic district on the National Register of Historic Places.

Begin the self-guided tour at the **Senoia**Welcome Center on Main Street. It includes more than 45 homes and several churches, with structures encompassing such diverse styles as Gabled Ell, Neo-Classical, New South Cottage, Saddlebag, and Victorian Gothic. Particularly noteworthy is the 1906 Greek Revival mansion on Seavy Street that operates as **The Veranda**Historic Bed & Breakfast Inn. Notable guests here included author Margaret Mitchell, who interviewed Confederate veterans at the inn for her epic novel *Gone with the Wind*.

Located a short distance from downtown is the **Senoia Area Historical Society Museum**. Housed in the 1870 Carmichael home at 6 Couch Street, the museum is filled with artifacts that bring to life the story of Senoia and is open on Friday and Saturday afternoons. The nearby **Buggy Shop Museum**, at 74 Main Street, displays a collection of antique automobiles, musical instruments, machinery, and other period memorabilia, and is open by appointment.



And, more is on tap, literally, as Coweta prepares for the opening of its second brewery early next year. From Georgia Peach snoballs and espresso-infused protein drinks to smoked cocktails and fine wine, Coweta delivers on liquid inspiration.



The snoball, one of the south's most luscious refreshers, is always a good bet for the ultimate thirst-quencher. Visit Beez Freeze in the heart of downtown Senoia for an authentic Georgia Peach Snoball or opt for a handmade milkshake. They also have a play area with sandbox and several free games, making it a prime spot for young families. You'll also find shaved ice offerings at Pelican's SnoBalls in Newnan and The Frigid Frog in both Sharpsburg





and Newnan. If caffeine is on your mind, you'll find it in all its glorious forms at Coweta's **Leaf & Bean**. Coffee, tea, and espresso selections are top notch, but be sure to look for seasonally inspired refreshments such as their from-scratch lavender lemonade. Heirloom Bakeshop (in both downtown Newnan and Sharpsburg) also delivers on serious caffeine concoctions such as the Heirloom Enforcer—a blend of espresso and protein drink.

The wine, beer, and craft cocktail scene is alive and well across Coweta County as restaurants such as Knife & Stone, Newnan's upscale dining gem, deliver clever twists on the classics-case in point, their popular Smoked Old Fashioned. Wine lovers should visit Grayson's Steak & Seafood, which boasts a compelling wine list with a global menu of options. Shop for a cookout with friends at Ace Growlers where, in addition to offering beer by the pint or growler, they butcher their own meats and sell a nice selection of wine, cheese, and seafood. Abide **Brewery** is the county's first microbrewery, and on weekends they offer the full experience with a rotating selection of food trucks and live music. Enjoy local brews such as 7 Day Haze or a Cherry Lime Hibiscus Seltzer at Senoia's newest brewery, Senoia Beer Company. Looking ahead to early next year, Pint & Provisions Brewery will open in Senoia. Inspired by the famous "tank rooms" of Europe, none of the beers will be stored in kegs, and guests can expect a range of selections including IPAs, Mexican lagers, and Belgian-style witbiers.

TO MARKET, TO MARKET

VISIT ONE OF COWETA COUNTY'S MARKETS FOR FRESH PRODUCTS AND A UNIQUE EXPERIENCE


Coweta County is nestled in an agriculturally rich region of Georgia and hence home to several noteworthy farmers markets, each one with its own distinctive charms and experiences. Spend a Saturday exploring everything from local farmers markets to organic and you-pick farms and bring home a true taste of Georgia.



Kick off your weekend at **Senoia's Farmer's** Market (Saturdays, 8:30 a.m.-1 p.m.), largely considered to be the social event of the week. Here, you can order a to-go Bloody Mary or mimosa at one of the markets' two different bars, and then wander the offerings. Vendors change from week to week, but expect a good selection of produce, live music, and tasty bites from local restaurants-keep an eye out for the breakfast burrito, a local favorite. Newnan's town square hosts The Market Day (first Saturday of the month from April through December, 10 a.m.-2 p.m.), where you'll find more than 50 booths featuring everything from locally grown produce and honey to pottery and handcrafted furniture. Musicians are invited to bring their instruments and join in for "Pickin' on the Square," a relaxed jam session for players of all skill levels.

Just down the road from Newnan's square is the **Coweta County Farmer's Market** (June to October, Wednesday and Saturday from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m.), which features a weekly offering of whatever is in season as well as eggs, a selection of baked goods, and arts and crafts.

180-Degree Farm provides much more than fresh, organically raised produce and meatsit's also a destination for those battling cancer. After struggling through their son's cancer battle (he is now in remission), the Tyson family started 180-Degree Farm to provide anyone fighting cancer with access to fresh, organically raised products. Open every Saturday year-round from 9:30 a.m. until 1 p.m., the farm also sells locally butchered meats, yogurt, and eggs. Visitors can stock up on fresh, healthy, nutrientdense food, explore one of their flower gardens, or wander the nature trail. They also offer regular volunteer opportunities, and you can order products online.



Pay a visit to Curly the Bull, who shares his pasture with several beehives, at Whitley

Farms. This family-owned, you-pick operation has strawberries and blueberries along with a selection of homemade jams and honey (harvested right from Curly's pasture). Take a class at Country Garden Farms, where they sell everything from produce to pasture-raised beef, chicken, and pork. Owners Mike and Judy Cunningham offer classes and hands-on workshops on how to grow, preserve, and cook fresh produce. Their cattle, pigs, and chickens are pasture-raised and never given antibiotics or hormones, and all produce is Certified Naturally Grown.



MUST-DO DAY TRIP

MORNING

Newnan

Start your morning at **Leaf & Bean**, a cozy coffee shop on the square offering tasty breakfast options made with local ingredients. (Pro tip: Wash down your meal with one of their rotating lemonade flavors; the lavender is a big hit.) Next, head to the **Historic** Coweta County Courthouse, a gorgeous 1904 Classic Revival building anchoring the town square. If court is in session, the court rooms and jury rooms are off limits, but the building houses historic imagery and salvaged pieces from the 2010 restoration worth checking out. Spend the rest of the morning wandering around the picturesque downtown and popping into shops and boutiques lining the square, including Red Letter Merchant, a unique vintage clothing store; Gillyweeds gift shop; and **Newnan Mercantile**, a home goods hotspot.

AFTERNOON

Sharpsburg, Turin, Senoia

Head to family-owned Whitley Farms (open Thursday through Saturday) for an abundance of seasonal produce. Pick your own strawberries and blueberries during the summer, and stock up on homemade jams, local honey, and baked goods at the market. Next, wind your way through historic Sharpsburg, a quaint town with 150 years of history. Be sure to drive past the old **Bridges & Cole** building; the current mayor, Blue Cole, is from one of the original families in the area. On your way to Senoia, stop in Turin to see one of Coweta's quirky roadside attractions: Barbie Beach, Since 2006, the six-by-four stretch of sand has featured Barbies and Kens posed in themed displays of current events, such as the Final Four playoffs, the Olympics, and the royal wedding. Once you're in Senoia, take time to explore along **Main Street**, home to plenty of local restaurants and boutiques. A trip here isn't complete without going on a film and TV tour. Fans of The Walking Dead will love exploring different filming sites from the most-watched TV series in basic cable history. Other famous films and TV shows shot here include Sweet Home Alabama, Fried Green Tomatoes, and Lovecraft Country.



DINNER

Senoia

Grab a table at **Nic & Norman's**, a laidback restaurant owned by *The Walking Dead* actor Norman Reedus and executive producer, director, and special make-up effects supervisor Greg Nicotero. Mouth-watering starters, gourmet burgers, and hearty entrees make up the dinner menu, while brunch features an assortment of "hangover helpers."



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HITTING A HIGH NOTE

DIVERSE MUSIC OPTIONS ABOUND IN A VARIETY OF COWETA VENUES

When it comes to music, Coweta has it covered. From jazz and acoustic to rhythm and blues, there's something playing almost every week in a variety of locations around the county, including parks, auditoriums, brewpubs, and restaurants.



Greenville Street Park, located within walking distance of Newnan's historic downtown district, is one of the area's most popular music venues. The two-acre urban oasis features a terraced lawn area, a covered pavilion, and a stage that serves as a small amphitheater. It's home to Jazz in the Park, a regular summer series sponsored by the Newnan Cultural Arts Commission, as well as Summer NewnaNights, a series of family-friendly music and entertainment events sponsored by Main Street Newnan.

For an indoor experience, head to the historic

Wadsworth Auditorium, also located in
downtown Newnan. Its lineup of concerts
sponsored by the Newnan Cultural Arts
Commission range from classical to Big Band.
Occasionally, musicals are performed here as well.

The **Donald W. Nixon Centre for Performing** and **Visual Arts**, a modern 48,000-square-foot facility anchored by a 1,000-seat theater, hosts several concerts and musical productions each year. The local Masterworks Chorale regularly performs here; and the Centre Strings Orchestra, a volunteer student-community orchestra based at the Nixon Centre, holds concerts at the venue each May and December.

Although stage plays are the primary focus at the **Newnan Theatre Company**, musicals are sometimes performed here. Past productions include *Bye Bye Birdie*, *Godspell*, *The Sound of Music*, and *9 to 5 the Musical*.

For a more laid-back experience, **The Alamo** features bands and acoustic musicians every weekend and is a favorite scene of Newnan residents and visitors alike. Often referred to simply as 'The Mo,' the downtown movie theater turned music venue has hosted hundreds of local and regional performers as well as such widely recognized musicians as Chubby Checker, Kool & The Gang, and Sugarland. Also on the menu are burgers, pizza, and wings, as well as curated drink specials and craft beers.



Another casual Newnan venue is the **Abide Brewing Company**. It features a rotating lineup of musicians, along with food trucks and specialty brews in a family-friendly atmosphere. The brewery's annual Rockin' Newnan Bash highlights a variety of local artists, all playing original music.


At **The Bays**, the casual dining and entertainment extension of popular downtown Newnan restaurant The Cellar, Wednesdays are devoted to jazz and Thursdays to acoustic. Bands play every weekend. Guests also can enjoy a chef-driven menu, a large bar, and two patios.

A few miles away, **Senoia Alive After Five** features a downtown summer concert series along with vendors, food trucks, and kids' activities. Also popular is **PorchFest Senoia**, a neighborhood celebration where porches and yards become the stages for local and regional bands. The Senoia Downtown Development Authority sponsors both events.

The Coweta County Fairgrounds & Conference Center showcases a variety of talented musicians, particularly during fair week, when acts range from classic rock and reggae to Southern gospel and blues. In 2021, country star Alan Jackson, a Newnan native, performed a sold-out concert to raise money for tornado relief.



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HAPPY TRAILS

COWETA'S LINC OFFERS A TRIFECTA OF RECREATION, TRANSPORTATION, AND QUALITY OF LIFE

In 2017, the city of Newnan and the Coweta County
Commission approved a master plan to develop a 26-mile
network of paved paths that serves to "repurpose some
of the public rights-of-way and greenspace to create safe
and enjoyable spaces for walking, biking, and socializing in
Newnan/Coweta."

The goal was to connect the east and west sides of Newnan, with all trails leading to the downtown district, as well as positively impact property values, community health, and economic development in the area. The multi-use path has become a family favorite for riding through Newnan. Like the Atlanta Beltline or the Silver Comet Trail, the LINC will eventually connect larger neighborhoods with area attractions, such as the Newnan Center and Ashley Park. "The first section of LINC goes from our neighborhood to my son's elementary school," Brent Snodgrass, operations manager for Coweta County Parks and Recreation, says. "So we made a new tradition—we biked the first day of school together. He rides his own bike, and he's 5 years old."

A visitor's experience along the path is further enhanced through public art installations. Two murals were designed by muralist John Christian in collaboration with Newnan High School art students in 2019, and the first public art sculpture, created by Chris Rothermel, was gifted to the LINC in 2022. A second sculpture, designed by University of West Georgia student Kelli Cadena, was installed along the trail in late 2022 as part of a larger public art project. It was designed using historic patterns from the R.D. Cole Manufacturing Company and aluminum from Bonnell Aluminum, two cornerstone industries of Newnan from both its past and present.

So far, nearly five miles of the total 26-mile path have been opened. A third phase, dubbed the "missing LINC," is set to be completed soon.
